

Diocesan Guild of Church Bellringers Central Branch Newsletter (number 81) March 2013

In the belfry in **All Saints church, Nettleham**, there hangs a board commemorating the ringing by a local band of men of a full peal on the bells on April 19th 1813. It reads :-

On Easter Monday.
In the year of our Lord.
One Thoufand and Eight hundred and
Thirteen. Was rung here Five
Thoufand and Forty Changes in
different peals in Three hours and
Five minutes on the 19 of April.
by us whofe names are here written.
1st Richard Johnfon 4th Wiliam Pattinfon
2nd Jofeph Pearfon 5th William Vickers
3rd William Clayworth 6th George Grundy

Old Nettlehamites recognise some good old Nettleham surnames there! As such a feat was rare in those days, the present ringers felt that we wanted to celebrate the 200th anniversary of this ringing. Because few of the present Nettleham band feel up to ringing - and concentrating non-stop - for nearly three hours, we have decided to attempt a quarter peal on the actual anniversary. We are also arranging for friends from the neighbouring churches to come and ring a full peal on our bells the following day – Saturday 20th April, starting at 2 pm. Dave is the only Nettleham ringer involved, and as at the time of writing he is nursing a broken arm, his fitness is in question. Time will tell, the board only tells us it was ‘rung in different peals’. Does this mean simply ‘ringing seven extents (peals in those days were often the term given to full extents)? Or did they ring in different methods? If so, how many? What were they? We have no means of knowing. We therefore have decided to ring seven extents of Plain Bob Minor - whether called differently is up to Chris who is conducting it for us. Jonathan is working on a video link so that we can see on

screen in the church what is happening among the bells, and see the ringers in action.

During this time there will be a display in the church and fun activities for those interested and, of course, there will be tea/coffee and cakes. Phil is also bringing his 'mobile belfry' so if you fancy having a ring on the pots (sorry Phil; ceramic bells!) you know where to come. There will even be a birthday cake as well! It will be cut at 3.30, to give us time to eat it before the children's service at 4. We shall certainly save some for the ringers when they emerge from up the tower! Do come and celebrate an afternoon of fun and fellowship with us! We hope any donations at this time will help towards the cost of repairs that are needed to the fabric of the tower. (Perhaps we can even raise enough for the hire of one of the scaffolding poles!)

Incidentally, 1813 seems to be a significant date here in Nettleham - the small 'calling bell' that John Ketteringham acquired for us second hand during the Millennium restoration of the bells co-incidentally has the date 1813 inscribed on it! He tells me that it was unusual to have any inscription on that sort of bell.

We know that there has been a ring of 3 bells at Nettleham since 1724. They were augmented to a peal on 6 in 1740, but although we have records of when they were restored, we have no idea of who actually rang them since the 1813 peal until 1930 when the Report that year named two members of the Guild. Suffice to say that we ringers follow in an ancient tradition of ringing each week to call people to worship. We hope to be able to continue this for many years to come - but to be able to do this we need to constantly teach new members. Anyone interested will be given training at their own pace. Ringers are a happy, friendly bunch who would love to welcome you into our midst.

From the Branch Committee on February 27th

* The **ringing programme** discussed. See above. The towers to be visited on the outing in July were queried. To be arranged nearer the time, but the destination to remain the same.

Thank you Betty for this piece:-

When we are ringing we often say, 'We don't know who is listening'. As we locked up after the afternoon practice at Washingborough a lady approached us and told us that she was the lollipop lady from Heighington school and she had been with the family visiting a very new grave of a six year old girl who had died of cancer. She said the family were very pleased to hear the joyful sound of the bells as it reminded them of the happy times they had had with the little girl. Being a practice we had had the usual problems but if something went wrong the bells were quickly brought into rounds before another attempt. To the people outside it all sounded good!

It was asked whether the Guild would be producing a **Christmas card** this year. Fund Raising Committee to look into this. (NB This will **not** affect our Branch Card.)

Let there be light!

There has been much interest shown on the matter of being left ringing in the dark.

John Ketteringham writes:- With regard to the item 'Belfry Safety'.

Surely the easiest solution is to have a two or three way light fitting? If one bulb fails then there will be one or two that will still be alight!!. This is what we had at Alford.

Yes, John, but that does not help in the case of a power cut.

Walter Froggatt writes, 'Ref to Dunholme's problem, if there is a 13amp (switched) socket in the belfry, it should be possible to obtain a light with a light sensitivity on P.I.R. sensor which will play into the socket. This is switched in when ringers enter, to off again when they leave. If the belfry is suddenly plunged into darkness, this light will immediately come on; if it is sensitive only to light/darkness this is automatic, but if it is a P.I.R movement is also required, but if ringing is in progress this would be more than sufficient to bring the light on. His letter then gives diagrams for those who understand such things. If you want to go into this I will show you the letter.

At Nettleham we have a lantern torch plugged in which automatically lights if the power fails.

Yes, but that is not on the lighting circuit and will not work if the fuse trips, which is what happened at Dunholme.

The emergency light at Hackthorn is on the same circuit as the lights, as the new one at Dunholme is going to be.

But what if someone switches off the light, whose switch is downstairs, away from the belfry?

They have purchased a table lamp which is lit as a second source of light.

We cannot think of any other worst case scenario waiting to catch us out. Can you? I find the only fail-safe answer is always to make new ringers ring with their eyes shut, with a trusted mentor standing by their side before they are let loose on their own. I have done this for many years, they complain that they don't like it, but it does prove to them that they can set a bell without having to look at it, so that they are less easily fazed in an emergency. The unexpectedness of sudden darkness leads to panic, which itself causes the problem. Any comments or additions to this debate? **It is important to consider this potential problem in the interests of safety.**

Obituary Gill Bland

We were very shocked by the sudden death of Gill Bland. She and Ian learned to ring in the Nottingham area, and on retiring they moved to Heckington to be nearer their family. Once there, Gill threw herself into her new life, always busy, caring for her grandchildren, and doing many good works in the village, and particularly in the church. She was an experienced ringer, going with Ian to ring around the Guild, never pushing herself forward and often having one ring and then content to sit and watch us all. She and Ian worked hard to teach a band of ringers in Heckington, and she formed a hand-bell group there, taking the bells and their tunes to entertain around the area. They performed at several of our branch carol services. She was an avid designer and knitter, and we all enjoyed the fair-isle jumpers worn by both of them -

particularly those with ringing themes. Our sympathies go to Ian and the family. She will be greatly missed by many people. R.I.P.
