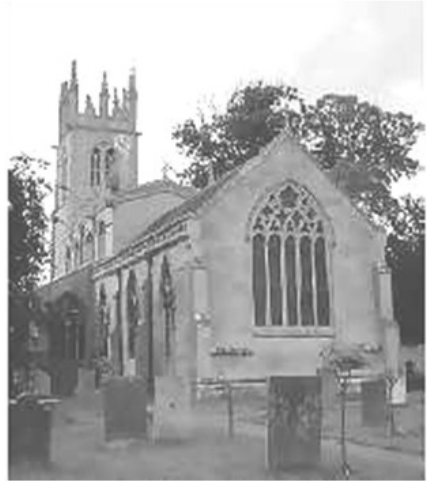

Central Branch Meeting February 8th



The afternoon meeting was held at two different towers. North Rauceby for the first hour and then a quick trip down the road to Fulbeck for the second hour. Thankfully the rain held off and the wind blew away any cobwebs. Thank you to Martin Clarke, a Southern branch member but we won't hold it against him, for opening up at Rauceby and putting the heating on and to our ringing master Richard for running the practices and managing to cater for all abilities. Attendance was good with 19 ringers at the first tower and 21 at the second.

At Rauceby 17 of us managed to squeeze into the tower and Jonathan nearly had to be pulled through the door with all his riding gear on. Margaret and Fiona stayed downstairs putting the world to rights. We had some good and some not so good ringing and striking. A number of doubles methods were rung ranging from Plain Bob to Stedman. In addition a plain course of North Rauceby Pleasure Bob, a new method for most, was completed with no restarts. After finishing at Rauceby, one or two members left and were replaced by newcomers at Fulbeck.

Fulbeck saw 21 people crammed into the tower sitting or standing wherever they could. Sandra nearly missed the ringing chamber but was caught in time climbing higher up the stairs. Once again a number of methods were rung from Plain Bob to Surprise. It was noted that Dot had trouble ringing even when

standing on a box, perhaps a small ladder would be helpful. For those who hadn't been to the tower before, the 5th caused one or two problems as it was hidden from view by the sheer number of people.

A most enjoyable afternoon and thank you again to all those involved in running the meeting.

John B. Carr

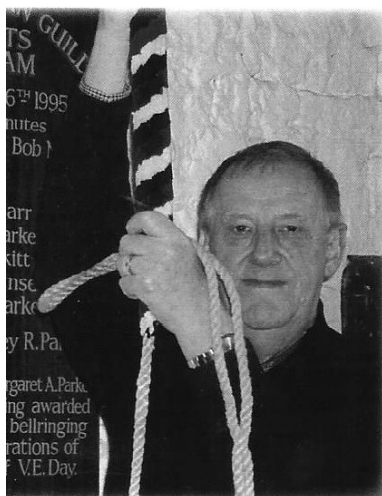
1946-2014

Nettleham Church was full of people come to pay their respects at the funeral of John Carr, a local businessman and bell ringer. The Tenor was tolled as he entered the Church, and local and branch ringers rang half muffled as his sons carried him to the churchyard. Tina was touched by the fact that the ringing restarted just as the coffin was being lowered into the grave.

In 1991 the ringers recruited seven children from Nettleham junior school. Tina provided the transport for her son Christopher. She too tried her hand and John was soon drawn in by their enthusiasm. Since then he has been a valuable member of the band, soon becoming Secretary/Treasurer and Tower Correspondent, as well as regular support and service ringer. He also became Examiner of Accounts for the Branch and the Guild. He rang his first quarter for Candlemas in 1992, and within the year all three members of the family had rung one together. He trebled to the local peal of Bob Minor in 1995, and regularly rang for Nettleham in the branch Striking Contests.

When they moved to Thorpe-on-the-Hill, their heart was still in Nettleham, and they drove across to ring for morning service at Nettleham until his health made that no longer possible. He was always cheerful and reliable. A great asset to the tower. In his personal life he was always noted for his friendship and willingness to help others. Like so many people, I personally owe him a great debt of gratitude. Men like John are hard to find. Our thoughts are with Tina and their family.

May he rest in peace.

- * **Ringing Foundation** request contribution to costs. To show our intent we will make a small donation.
- * **Numbers** of full members are down, but Junior members are up.
- * **Subs for 2015** unchanged (at the moment). 50% General Fund, 35% BRF, 15% Branches.
- * Discussion about establishing a **Training Fund**. Guild subs to be split 4 ways?- but this would reduce the contribution to the BRF. How are projects to be funded?
- * Need for **new auditors**.
- * **Request for photos** for next year's calendar.
- * Master thanked Dot for her work on BRF.
Robin Heppenstall to replace Dot as **BRF Administrator**. Dot to continue with the 100 club.
- * Discussion of **Honorary Life Members**. HLM's should be people who have made significant contribution to the Guild. Long serving members should be recognised in the form of a roll of honour. They will be presented with a certificate signed by our Patron. Guidelines will be produced.
- * **Guild Striking Competition**. Nettleham - Cup, Dunholme - Plate.
- * **Ridgeman Trophy** - 7 June
- * **National Youth** - 5 July at Worcester
- * **Website** - Hosting to be revised. Sub domains to be provided so each branch has its own site; webmaster to have overall control, but each domain to have its own password. Members of the Web Committee to review. As we have paid up for this year, we will proceed with this new arrangement until it needs to be renewed.
- * The master felt members had found the **Guild Review** process overwhelming. He has had a good response and has now produced a simpler version to be put forward at the AGM. He needs membership approval to proceed.
- * Importance of establishing a **Training Officer** and to decide how an education fund can be supported.
- * Discussion about **re-thinking Striking Contests**. Graham Colborne to give a presentation on the new proposals at the AGM.

Margaret, How Did The Newsletter Start?

In the Spring of 1990, when Judy Williamson was Branch Secretary, in the days before everyone (well, nearly everyone) had e-mail, sharing news and information was causing a headache. Thus the idea of producing a Branch Newsletter first came into being. One Sunday morning, going up the stairs to ring at the Cathedral, we paused to catch our breath (well, who wouldn't?) I showed Judy a newsletter from another organisation and said, "If we do a newsletter, this might be a good format." Judy immediately replied, "Are you volunteering?" "Not really," I replied, but too late – I had already put my head above the parapet and learnt (temporarily) to keep my mouth shut! I borrowed an old portable typewriter and started to put ideas onto paper, giving the untidy results to Judy who had them typed up properly for photocopying and we were off! Since then I have edited 84 editions, and now it's time for someone with computer skills to take over. I am grateful to Gill Gladman from Nettleham for taking on this enjoyable (?) task.

It has been a learning curve all the way. Firstly I started to number the editions to counter the complaint that a certain gentleman had not received his previous edition and he took some convincing that the one he claimed to have missed was never produced! This practice came back to haunt me recently when you had two edition 81's and no 82 – in the days before word processors, forgetting to update the heading could not have happened (every technical advance has its drawback!) I have still not mastered the technology. Trevor tells me how much work I cause myself by physically cutting out the articles and pictures and sticking them together with glue (isn't that what cutting and pasting means?!)

As for the mistakes – every edition has a least one! – and some of you delight in pointing them out to me as soon as they have their copy in their hands! – but this does assure me that you have read it, unlike the man who on receiving his folds it and puts it into his pocket, then complains that no-one has told him about some event or other. Telling him it was in his Newsletter if he actually got round to reading it doesn't go down very well!

You are all aware of how we fund printing costs. Originally charging 10p per ringer for including each quarter covered it. This had to go up to 20p and then 30p. Finally, with increase in costs and reduction in number of quarters being rung, we could no longer pay our way. We had become aware that many were left in the tower as people were reading it on-line, so we agreed to charge everyone who wanted their own copy £2 a year, the quarter peal contributions paying for a free copy for each tower. Having put that into action, I have found a much cheaper printer, and more quarters are being rung again, so once again

you get them free. We have the list of those wanting their own; if you want your name adding let us know.

I am eternally grateful to everyone over the last years who have played their part by sending articles, reports and 'funnies' (it would be dry indeed without the one-liners; you do say such funny things; I don't make them up!) Please keep them coming in. The Newsletter is only as good as the stuff you send to put in it --- and like a travel brochure, you can only experience the wonderful things it advertises by actually joining in! Do take part in the activities it tells you of!
