Lincoln Guild AGM at Methodist Church Bailgate, Lincoln Saturday 30th April

As usual car parking at the Bailgate Methodist Church was at a premium, Nettleham Road proved a 5 minute walk away.

Since the new Dean had not been appointed, the Guild Ringing Master Alan Payne chaired the meeting. The meeting stood for a minute in honour of those members who died during 2015.

Roger Lord gave the financial report for 2015, explaining the published accounts which were accepted by the meeting. He reported that subscriptions would remain the same for 2017. Alan Payne reported on the BRF Fund accounts. The percentage split of subscriptions for 2016 were confirmed as General Fund 50%, BRF 25%, Training Fund 10% and Branch retention 15%. John Nicholson presented the Guild Report for 2015, thanking those who contributed for their promptness in submitting Margaret Parker proof reading reports. for and acknowledgement of the photographs of the Young Ringers Bands. The Report was accepted by the meeting.

Election of Officers saw Alan Payne re-elected as Master for, what he has said, is his final year and Roger Lord re-elected as Treasurer. Sandra Underwood has stood down as Secretary and to date no replacement has been nominated - the Guild Committee will deal with the administration for the time being. Three of the Guild representatives on the Central Council will remain until 2017 but Robin Heppenstall has stood down.

Presentations were made to Sandra Underwood and Robin Heppenstall. The remaining members of the Guild Committee were re-elected en-bloc. Ian Till nominated Melvyn Rose from Epworth for the Roll of Honour and this was agreed by the meeting.

Future Events were reported:

- Central Council Meeting in Portsmouth on 28th/30th May.
- Ridgeman Trophy 4th June.
- National Youth Striking Competition London 2nd July, where we have two teams representing the Guild.
- Guild Striking Competitions 6 bell 10th September Whaplode and Moulton, - 8 Bell 1st October Ingoldmells.
- May 17th/19th and 24th/26thSchools Festival in Cathedral
- July 23rd Young Ringers Summer Festival based at Dunholme Village Hall and local churches

Ringers were made aware of the changes to faculties for repairs to bells which is published on the Website.

Update on Safe Guarding also on Website and Joy Lord was confirmed as Safe Guarding Officer for the Guild.

Change to Striking Competition Rules. No Ringer shall take part in two teams. Last year the rules caused issues as ringers were in both the Plate and the Cup teams. Cup will be method minor or doubles, Plate - call changes.

Concern expressed over the state of ringer numbers and how ringing within the Guild reflects the National trend. Focus on more recruitment and training.

Womble has been booked out a number of times, available for any display event as long as transport is available.

100 Club was drawn,1st prize to Sleaford Tower, 2nd David Bennett, 3rd John Collett,4th Dot Mason, 5th Tracy Black.

BBQ at Sibsey Mill 2nd July.

There being no further business the meeting closed and we retired to the Methodist Hall for Lunch.

The Guild's OneBell (Womble!) simulator had been erected by the Church door and Jonathan had rigged up microphone and cameras in both the bell and ringing chambers, linked to a couple of monitors so that the ringing that then ensued could be seen (and heard) in the church.

For an hour, visitors mingled, watching what was happening "upstairs" trying their hand on the simulator and chatted to the ringers about what they were seeing.

The afternoon closed with a short service led by Sally, a Hackthorn ringer. Thank you Les for playing the organ. Many thanks, too, for the ladies for such a lovely lunch, to the men for fetching and assembling the simulator, and to Jonathan for installing the video link. Last, but by no means least, thank you to the Branch members who came to ring (so that we could be sure that there was something for the visitor s to see!) This mutual help and friendship within the Guild is a great privilege to be treasured and enjoyed by ringers nationwide.

A good day was had by all, and we are hopeful that we have inspired a number of possible recruits.



New stay for the Treble at Waddington - so what?

One practice evening, the inevitable happened. A stay broke. On any other bells, yes it would take time and effort to make a stay but at Waddington the time and effort was as it seemed, quadrupled because the stays were Hasting stays. Anyone who does not know what a Hasting stay looks like, then look at the photo. The dimensions needed to be reproduced exactly, to enable the stay to fit into the frame.

The old one was not made of ash and had splintered with just a tap. So since it was no longer much of a pattern, how was a new one to be made? At Waddington, we were very fortunate to have the new stay for the treble to be quickly and professionally made by Tom Blyth. Tom rang Taylors who had supplied and hung the bell in 1959. They still had the dimensions of the original stay on record so the new stay is an exact match, -- very important with Hastings stays. Colin Ward

A letter from the Branch President

Sermons at our AGMs frequently remind us of this and thank us for our service and we all come out in a 'holy glow'. Let us strive to deserve it. We are <u>all</u> guilty. Re-read the words of the ringers' hymn 'Unchanging God'. Lord help us to listen.

Ringing World National Youth Contest 2nd July

An early start was required for the Ringing World National Youth Contest, which included catching the train as early as 6.55am (which did not go down well with a bunch of teenagers!). Wearing our brand new fluorescent orange team t-shirts, we were greeted with some wonderful heat and lovely sunshine, and made our way to St Mary le Bow (which was our headquarters for the day).

After our team was registered, and given our wrist bands (along with a record 23 other teams!), we headed down towards St Pauls Cathedral (before our test piece at St Dunstan in the West) for our tower tour, as we weren't scheduled to ring our test piece till 11.40 am. After a rather hot and sweaty tube ride, we

arrived at St Pauls Cathedral and received warm welcomes from the regular ringers of St Pauls. We were guided through a long walkway that is only accessible to the bell ringers and other St Pauls workers, and were greeted with the sight of the famous spiral staircase that was featured in many of the Harry Potter films (which everyone, especially a certain few loved to see). Once we had finally managed to pry away the intense Harry Potter fans we were guided up to the ringing room which was an incredible sight! We were greeted with the sight of peal boards painted on the walls and a tenor box that had a set of stairs to leading up to it (Yes, it really was that big!). After our educational talk on the ringers of St Pauls Cathedral, we were guided up to the bells and got to see some fantastic views of the Shard, London Eye and the River Thames. What amused most people was seeing the treble bell next to the 6 tonne tenor bell, the size difference was crazy!



After seeing the 12 bells we made our descent of the tower, and back to the entrance where our 'responsible' adults were waiting for us.

What awaited us next was our test piece, and as conductor I was rather nervous as I'd only begun conducting 3 weeks prior to the competition!

Once we arrived at St Dunstan in the West (having first located the nearest McDonalds for afterwards) and had our team photo taken, we headed upstairs to ring on the back 8 of the 10 bells. After a team talk, and a brief reminder that we were to ring Queens and Whittingtons we began our practice piece which

involved changing to Queens and standing after a few rows in Queens. The practice was rather shaky as the bells were hard to control, but after rope adjustments were made and boxes were handed out, and we all took a deep breath, we did the 1212 1212 signal and began our test piece. Everyone handled the bells incredibly well throughout the test piece and you'd wonder whether it was the same team during the practice piece! The piece went incredibly well and everyone came out very proud, so we signed the books, grabbed our bags and ran (with the exception of a couple) to McDonalds and rewarded ourselves with the lovely taste of fast food, which was well deserved. Once we were stuffed with food, we made our way back to St Mary le Bow to await the results of the Qualifier to see which teams would go through to the final. Only 2 teams from each tower can go through one for call changes and one for method ringing. Sadly, we did not make it through to the final, but we still had no idea how we did or if we had just missed out on a place in the final.

So we headed up to ring on the famous Bow bells, which were hard but very enjoyable to ring. And a mention to Laura Watt who rang so well on the 12 bells and managed to master the second in only a couple of rows, well done! Next on our list was St James Garlickhythe (which was one of the other towers to hold one of the heats) which was a rather light ring of 8, and were the Jubilee bells that were ringing on a barge for the Queens Diamond Jubilee celebrations, they were one of the nicest rings of 8 I have ever come across and many would agree! The other towers we rang at included St Botolph, Bishopgate and Christ Church, Spitalfields, both interesting rings of 8.

We then ventured back to Mary Le Bow for the results and took our seats as a team and all the adults unfortunately had to stand at the back. They gave

comments to each of the teams from the qualifiers and then comments on the rings at the final. Our feedback was that we had a good ring with a strong tenor beat to it, but we appeared uncertain in our changes and that is where our faults occurred (something to remember for next year guys, be more confident!) We nervously awaited our results which, as every year has been so far, graded

between $C - A^*$. We were expecting to come away with a 'B' grade again like we had done for the past 5 years, however our team wasn't called up during the 'B' grades, and we were stunned that when our team was announced we had achieved a fantastic grade 'A', which was followed by a rather large "WOOHOO" by yours truly! After hearing the rest of the results it turned out that only 2 teams from our qualifier tower had achieved an 'A' grade and that meant that we had narrowly missed out on reaching the finals and were slightly out performed by the Three Spires who were the lucky ones who got through to the final! Despite that, we were thrilled with our result, so once the results had been finished we left the church to find our team leaders to celebrate our result with many team photos that now include the medal we all were given. I couldn't have been more proud of our team, the way they rang, the team spirit we all had throughout the day and the way they coped with the competition scenario.

Sadly, this was my last year on the team after 6 wonderful years with them all. I'm proud to call myself a Lincolnshire Poacher, and would like to thank the team for making my last year the best one yet with our best result. It was wonderful to have my first competition in London and finish my last one in London too.

Special mentions must go out to Sue Faull and Ian Till for being such fantastic coaches to us and for organising everything and most importantly for putting up with us, I know we can all be quite the hyper active bunch! And also to Jonathan Clark for providing a stash of Tolberone and sandwiches throughout the day! (It was needed after the lengthy tube walk we had to do).

Congratulations once again Lincolnshire Poachers, I look forward to becoming one of the 'responsible' adults next year for the competition in Birmingham, and whoever takes the treble from me, tell them to look after it!

Central Branch Meeting and Striking Competition 9th July

Less than a year after 6 bells were installed by Whites of Appleton, North Scarle became the focus of the new Central Branch Ringing Striking Contest. The bells weigh from the treble's 2-2-10 to the tenor's 6-1-0 and ring well. The teams from Washingborough, Waddington, Welton and North Scarle rang from Call Changes to Grandsire Triples.

After the striking competition, Mick Stracey took the service with Les Townsend playing the organ. Then the judge, Caitlin from Alford, gave her judgement. Since the marks between 2 teams were so close, (only $\frac{1}{2}$ mark difference) Caitlin reviewed the marking scheme again to ensure all was correct. The atmosphere was tense.

Caitlin listened to 5 test pieces and here are her comments:

Advantages of a striking contest -

- Good reason to practice further beforehand to achieve good striking
- Motivates learners to achieve better striking
- Helps and gives credit to tower captains for their teaching since it is difficult to keep people motivated and this is an opportunity for their learners to hear good striking.

Results:

1st team: Practice good- some nerves – test piece promising - crashed out.

2nd team: Practice ok – call changes – some repeated changes had faults which were repeated – then settled. 25 faults.

 3^{rd} team: Practice time – ok – test piece – there were some unsettledness due to leading. 20 faults

 4^{th} team: Practice time ok– test piece – the best was in the first half then there were some mishaps unfortunately. $20\frac{1}{2}$ faults

 5^{th} team: Test piece – good start and there was really good ringing in the last $\frac{1}{3}$ of the piece. 13 faults

The 5th team were the winners but Caitlin did not know that this team were the 1st team, Washingborough, who crashed out but were encouraged to ring again, and rang so well!

Very graciously, Washingborough turned down the cup and the 3rd team, Welton received the new cup provided by Richard Spencer, the Central Branch Ringing Master. Congratulations to the Welton team who included 2 of the younger ringers in the branch.

Summary of the formal half-yearly meeting:

• The Central Branch President Margaret Parker wanted everyone to think about what is the way forward for ringing and meetings. Some meetings were dragging on. Suggestions included workshops instead of meetings focusing on a particular method or what the local band wanted to practice. MP wanted everyone to talk about this before the AGM next January - "Come back to the AGM with some ideas – It's your branch -- and we provide these events for your benefit."

- Xmas card: the Guild is organising Christmas cards with cartoons and a new Calendar for the Year 2017. A branch Xmas card was suggested. A vote was made to have Xmas cards produced and sold for the benefit of the branch BRF.
