Quiz night

On Saturday, 25th October, the Northern Branch descended on the village of Grasby for an hour's worth of ringing, going up to London S. Minor, followed by delicious hot dogs, soup and cakes at the village hall, courtesy of Nan Colley, Margaret Roach, Judith Willcocks and Joy Lord, followed by the main event, the quiz, hosted by Matthew Jeffery. It was nice to have enough support to have eight teams, and everyone enjoyed a brilliant evening, although some of the questions were fairly difficult! The questions covered subjects such as UK, Geography, TV, Entertainment, Sport, and there was an interesting music round where Matthew actually played extracts of songs from musicals on his digital piano. It was evident that some people needed to brush up on their general knowledge more than others, in fact somebody told Matthew that they didn't even have a TV!

The winning team was the Infamous Five, who received a large tin of Roses chocolates, closely followed by Titanic Cinques and then the South Ferriby Mudlarks. The unfortunate claimants of the toffee apples were the Magnificent Seven. Better luck next time! There was also a raffle, which made £51 and went towards the bell repair fund. Special thanks go to David Hibbert for obtaining the hall and all the aforementioned ladies for the superb job they did with the catering. Thanks also to some of the West Lindsey Branch who came to show their support.

Summary of Guild committee meeting

At the November meeting a winning honorary members certificate was chosen, this is now to be taken to branches and reviewed by members. Feedback is to be taken to the February guild committee meeting. The Lincoln Guild came second in the Ridgman Trophy. In the Guild 6 bell striking competition, 7 teams entered the cup and 7 teams entered the plate. 1st and 2nd in the cup were Messingham and Bourne while 1st and 2nd in the plate were Eagle and Swinderby. The barn dance had been a very successful evening, 105 tickets were sold and with the proceeds of the raffle £469 profit was made. So we need to find another large hall in another branch for next year. Other project that the BRF fund raising committee are on with include a new Guild pin badge to be available at the guild AGM, 2009.(*Now available*.)

AGM grand draw, this time tickets to be £1 to save paper and the environment. There are now fleeces available in the guild clothing. Sue needs to place a minimum of 12 orders at a time. The clothing sales have now made £200 profit, so £150 will be transferred to the guild BRF. Also requests are to be made for recipes, to make a guild recipe book to be on sale at the Guild AGM.

The format for the 2009 Guild AGM will be ringing, communion service, meeting followed by lunch, then 2 afternoon towers, light tea, Grand Draw, ringing for evensong at the cathedral and further ringing. The 8 bell competition will be held in the Southern branch on 24th October 2009, during the afternoon. Each branch is to talk about methods and take their suggestion back to the next Guild meeting.

The Guild report is to be the same new format as last year. No asterisks near members names for non-payers and names to be removed following year. Names will appear less formal, to be taken from peal and quarter peal records or as notified.

When a new web master was needed Sandra from central branch kindly agreed to take it on. Sue insisted that she would only need to give a few hours time to this on a Sunday. A few small changes have been made to the site and a communications channel has been drawn up, which will be summarised in the next branch newsletter.

The Archdeacon's guidelines are now in a final draft to be discussed with the Archdeacon. It was also mentioned that when organising events with youngsters we should use a permission form and supply the names of 2 CRB checked branch members to be child protection officers for the day. Ideally to be 1 male and 1 female.

Summary of Branch committee meeting

At our November Branch committee meeting, we officially welcomed Rev Elaine Turner and Andrew Lord to the committee since their election in May. We then reviewed the list of potential new ringers. Arrangements were discussed for our Branch Christmas Social to be held on Saturday 3rd Jan 2009. This was followed by discussing the content of the branch policy for damage caused by visiting ringers. We set out the program for 2009. We also reviewed the Hewitt Shield and decided that next year we will ask the branch for nominations and decide on who it will be awarded to at the November branch committee meeting. This meeting closed with Matthew presenting Lorraine with the certificate for her first Peal.

Simulator Update

In October the Northern Branch borrowed the Guild 6 bell simulator and installed it in Tealby Church for 2 weeks. During this time we had visits from the year 6 pupils from 3 local schools (Tealby, Caistor and Ludford) and had a widely publicised open day for those interested in "coming to have a go". The events were all manned by Ringers from around the Diocese as well as by the Tealby PCC and proved to be highly successful. We gathered feedback on the day and also contact details of anyone who expressed an interest in learning more; and as a result now have a list some 20+ new ringers. Many of these have attended ringing schools which we have held on subsequent Saturdays at Middle Rasen and with tuition and encouragement from experienced ringers the learners have been making fantastic progress. Indeed we are

hoping that after the next Saturday session that they will be able to join in at their local tower practices.

We also had several people interested in learning hand bell ringing, as this was also available to try out on the simulator days, and as a result a local group has been set up and performed at a Walesby Group carol service just before Christmas.

I would like to express my thanks to everyone who came to assist in any way with these events; I was deeply touched by the support that we received. My particular thanks go to Sue Faull for her tremendous energy, input and encouragement; to Charles Cade for masterminding the transport of the simulator; to Revd John Carr and the Tealby PCC for their assistance and for allowing us to take over part of their church for 2 weeks; to all the ringers who supported the open days and the subsequent teaching sessions and to the Revd Charles Patrick, the ringers and PCC of Middle Rasen for allowing us to use their bells for teaching and for the use of their church hall.

Announcement: Market Rasen St Thomas' Bells ringing once more!

St Thomas' Band begin to ring again at the start of December, following three years of silence owing to external work on the tower and associated path closure. The work had nothing to do with the bells or the tower structure itself, merely that the facing stones were in poor condition and "shedding. The roof had to be dealt with whilst the scaffolding was up. Members of our band spent one weekend on cleaning all levels inside the tower from builder's dust and the residue of pigeon mess. One benefit of the recent work has been long-term netting on the tower windows to prevent any further roosting, so we hope to see no more mess!

Our band is in good fettle, and it is with gratitude that we acknowledge the support of the Middle Rasen band who have helped to keep our band ringing these last years. However we now need to consolidate ourselves as a band again, so would respectfully ask that visitors give us a period of grace to do just that, before joining us on practice nights. We would like to invite our branch to hold one of it's meetings at Market Rasen in the early summer period. Await details of that through Branch officers. Hopefully all members will understand!

Walesby Carol service

On a horrible wet day, several branch members braved the muddy track to Walesby Old Church for this year's Candlelit Carol Service, which, once again, was a great occasion. The church was packed out and Rev. John Carr was on form, with an even bigger illuminated pointy stick (those who were there will know what I mean!). The ringers, who were mainly from Barton, Grimsby, Middle and Market Rasen with some West Lindsey support, were provided with coffee and mince pies and the ringing was generally good. Elaine also took part in the service and thanked the bellringers for ringing and for all the support they give to the church. She also praised the work of the Northern Branch, giving a special mention to Sue Faull and Matthew Jeffery. The service was rounded off by a rousing rendition of Auld Lang Syne, and then it snowed by the time the service was over. If you have not been before, you really are advised to go next year, as it really is a lovely spectacle.

Child protection

As we have a few more young ringers in the branch now, Towers should consider clicking on to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers website www.cccbr.org.uk. Click on the information and services tab, then CCCBR Guidelines and you'll see the Protect Young Ringers guidelines. Ringers are urged to absorb the guidelines into the normal way that ringing is organized to minimise any fuss been made or disruption caused. The guidelines are there to protect the adults as much as they are the under 18's. The guidelines should be used in conjunction with any set out by your own PCC / local arrangements. On the CCCBR guidelines it suggests that you ask parents / Guardians to complete a consent form when they join. It advises that two adults (if possible of different sexes) should normal be present whenever young people are taking part in ringing or being transported. They also point out that it is good practice for an attendance register to be kept and completed including the recording of the names of any visitors. Anyway take a little time to click onto the site and have a read for yourselves.

Whilst the majority of ringers take great care when ringing unfamiliar bells, we have unfortunately had a few experiences of visiting ringers causing damage to our bells and frames. For that reason we would like to draw your attention to the following policy on the Use of Bells by visiting Ringers which has been adopted within our Branch. Please sign and return one copy of this form to the Tower Captain or local representative of each church where a visit is planned. Thank you

Lincoln Diocese of Church Bell Ringers Northern Branch Policy on use of bells by visiting ringers January 2009

1.

- 2. This policy applies to all visits by groups of ringers from outside the Northern Branch of the Lincoln Diocese of Church Bell Ringers. It may, by agreement with the Tower Captain or nominated Tower Representative (in towers where no captain), be waived under certain circumstances. Any such waiver must be agreed in writing.
- 3. All visitors should arrange the details of their visit with the Tower captain of the parish church (or the nominated Tower Representative) in advance of the visit.
- 4. Visiting ringers should ensure that they are sufficiently experienced to cope with local conditions in a tower. eg at Walesby All Saints a long rope drop. Advice should be taken from the Tower captain or Tower representative.
- 5. It is suggested that a minimum donation of not less than £10.00 is paid to the tower fund of each church in advance or at the time of the visit.
- 6. Damage: Breakages will be charged at the following rates
 - Stay £25.00

More substantial damage will be assessed and be charged accordingly.
