1. President's Welcome and Opening Prayer

The meeting opened at 6:15pm with a prayer.

2. Apologies for Absence

3. Loss of members by death

We remembered Edward Colley who had enjoyed attending the half-yearly meeting at Legbourne, meeting up with friends and enjoying coffee cake. Nan had been pleased to hear that he had had an enjoyable last day with ringers. Soon after, Henry Conyers, who had also joined us at Legbourne, passed away. After a long illness Nancy Colley passed away less than 6 weeks after her husband. The branch had also lost John "Jack" Parker of Grimsby.

4. Adoption of Minutes of the 2010 Annual Meeting (previously circulated)

There were no amendments. The minutes were proposed by Matthew Jeffery and seconded by Joy Lord.

5. Matters arising from the minutes

There were no matters arising.

6. Reports (circulated previously)

The president's, secretary's, newsletter and website reports had already been circulated to allow this meeting to proceed more quickly. When asked, the floor agreed that having the reports in advance was a good idea and a help to them.

• Ringing Master's Report & Hewitt Shield presentation

Branch practices were, in general, well enough attended without having to rely on support from outside the branch. Apart from one incident in March (which was pretty shameful, it has to be said), they were happy, sociable occasions. The practice repertoire was much the same as in 2009, ranging up to surprise minor at the 6-bell practices. We haven't been having a lot of special methods, but this coming year, we will have more. I would encourage as many ringers, not just branch members, to come along. The more we have, the more we can ring.

It was nice to see a good turn-out for the annual evensong ringing at Lincoln Cathedral in August. After a minute's silence for Ted and Nan Colley, we concentrated mainly on call changes and plain hunt, and it's always very encouraging to see people fairly new to the activity wanting to have a go at ringing on higher numbers than what they're used to. We couldn't enter a team for the guild 8-bell striking competition as there aren't enough surprise major ringers in the branch. I find this rather sad. So I propose that we hold special practices devoted to surprise major, probably on a monthly basis, with a view to hopefully ringing the standard 8, and who knows, maybe beyond. I am aware that there are similar practices going on elsewhere in the guild, but I would like something exclusively for the Northern Branch. It is my ambition to have a branch touch of 8-spliced at an AGM, and indeed a branch quarter of 8-spliced. If anybody is interested, please let me know so that we can discuss it in more detail. Anybody who hasn't rung surprise major before, but would like to, would be very welcome. This year it will be this branch's turn to host the 8-bell competition, and the set piece will not be a surprise method, so please give it some thought. Thanks once again to Andrew Lord, the deputy ringing master, for taking charge of the ringing in my absence or lateness, particularly for the Oxfordshire tour, which I couldn't attend as I was judging a striking competition. I am assured it went well (the tour, that is). There were fewer peals rung by branch members and quarters rung in branch towers, but there were more actual branch members ringing peals. One peal in particular stands out, the one at St. Mary's in Barton in late November, which was rung by 8 members of that tower. This peal involved a few firsts: George Thompson's first on 8 bells, Linda Howden's first on tower bells and Roger Lord's first for more than 20 years. Congratulations to George Thompson and Daniel Young for ringing their first peal and conducting quarters for the first time, and also Kim Holland, Amy Dixon and John and Alice McNeil for ringing their first quarters. May you all go on to ring many more. Please ensure that everything you have rung is recorded on Campanophile, with the appropriate footnotes, otherwise it may not be accounted for. If you need help with doing this, please let me know. With the Alan Hewitt Shield, I had a few ideas as to who I thought should get it, there was Claxby for ringing in the new year after having their bells done up, there was Barton again for that fantastic aforementioned peal of theirs, but in the end I decided to give it to a tower whose bells were unringable for a long time, and the local band had to practice in the next village. Since their bells were made ringable again there has been a flurry of activity, including 4 quarter peals and a branch AGM. They rang a quarter for their Carols by Candlelight service and 2 of their ringers rang a quarter for the first time. So without further ado, it's my great pleasure to award the Hewitt Shield this year to the tower of St. Thomas, Market Rasen.

Treasurer's Report

General fund

Total guild membership for 2010 was 119, which includes 9 junior, 3 non-resident and 2 honorary life members. There were 6 new members elected and we lost 11. I would just like to remind members of a change to the guild rule re. payment of subs. At the guild AGM last year it was agreed that anyone who had not paid their guild subscription by Dec 31st of the current year shall be deemed to have withdrawn from the guild. Such a ringer wishing to

rejoin the guild must submit to re-election, such re-election to be subject to confirmation at a branch meeting.

The general fund had a surplus of £101.05 for the year and a balance of £1,409.55 will be carried forward to 2011.

The guild quota for 2011 based on branch subscriptions of £1,077 is £430.80 (40%) and the Guild BRF quota is £484.65 (45%).

Bell restoration fund

Income from collections/raffles etc. was down on 2009 to £98.50, and bank interest was also down as expected.

A grant was given to Legbourne (£100) and a donation of £50 was given to Walesby (new church) for their restoration projects.

The balance of £1,676.75 will be carried forward to 2011.

Thanks to David Hibbert for examining the accounts.

Roger proposed the accounts, Margaret Roach seconded them and the floor voted in favour of accepting them. Elaine thanked Roger for everything he does with the accounts and she thanked David Hibbert for being our independent examiner.

• Fund Raising Committee Report

As a branch we need to insure that we sell as many guild AGM raffle tickets as possible. This year the guild had not published the Christmas cards so that has left a gap in fundraising for the guild bell repair fund. Money and stubs need to be back to Dorothy by the beginning of April. Also please return any unsold tickets as it may be possible to sell them elsewhere in the guild. Dorothy has plenty of extra tickets should any tower need more due to high sales.

7. Election of officers

President: Elaine Turner – proposed by Norman Palmer, seconded by Simon Cole. All voted in favour. Elaine thanked the committee for all the behind-the-scenes work that they do and had done today in providing the tea for everyone.

Ringing Master: Matthew Jeffery – proposed by Andrew Lord, seconded by David Hibbert. All voted in favour.

Deputy Ringing Master: Andrew Lord – proposed by Matthew Jeffery, seconded by James Hibbert. All voted in favour. Elaine thanked Andrew for the good job that he'd done over the last few years.

Secretary: Lorraine Jeffery – proposed by Jenny Bennett, seconded by Joy Lord. All voted in favour.

Treasurer: Roger Lord – proposed by Joan Barton, seconded by Margaret Roach. All voted in favour. Roger has done a sterling job and has had a few bank account problems to sort, which he has done through a lot of patience.

Newsletter editor and guild committee representative: Joy Lord – proposed by Andy Bennett, seconded by Harry Minns. All voted in favour.

Guild fundraising committee representative, bell restoration fund trustees, NB rep on Guild Simulator Committee, NB rep on Guild Web Committee: These positions will be allocated from the current committee.

Branch Committee Reps: Linda Patrick, a new member to the committee, was proposed by Joy Lord and seconded by Simon Cole. All voted in favour and we are delighted to welcome her to the committee. James Hibbert will return to his post, proposed by Harry Minns and seconded by Andrew Lord. All voted in favour.

Independent examiner of accounts: David Hibbert – proposed by Roger Lord, seconded by Andy Bennett.

8. Election of new members

Neil Mangan of Grimsby and, on checking the records, Alex Sutcliffe of Waltham joined in October at Ulceby. There were no new members to join at this meeting. New members are always welcome and can be elected at any branch practice during the year. Subs is £10 for adults and £3 for children.

9. Peal Board for Ted and Nan Colley

It was very sad to lose Ted and Nan Colley last year. Members of the branch have asked for a lasting memorial. The committee has spoken to Stephen and John Colley, their sons, and they would be happy for a peal board to be donated by the branch to Caistor church in their memory, for the peal which was rung after the memorial service in September. John Colley has donated elm from Ted's workshop for the peal board to be made from. David Prescott (ex headmaster at South Kelsey school) has offered to make the board, only charging for any extra materials needed (no labour charge). So, including writing, the board should cost £60. Elaine proposed that perhaps people might like to place a donation for this, then the branch funds could top up any shortfall. All voted in favour of this.

Harry Minns then read out a few words in tribute to Ted and Nan which he had composed:

"It is fitting to call to mind how fortunate we are to have known Ted and Nan Colley in the world of bellringing. They both gave of themselves in the friendship and camaraderie when we met in practice nights, on outing and at meetings, taking the work of the committee including the sometimes difficult task of being officers.

On the practical side, Ted did so much for the local towers of Grasby and Caistor, rehanging and organising with many willing helpers the augmentation of the rings in Grasby from five to six and Caistor from six to eight. He was always there when work was done here in Tealby and other churches including Claxby. Nan was always there to support him in their efforts and in the money raising for their projects.

I cannot speak of the number of peals he rang in but I know they were many and he encouraged me to take part in a few quarter peals and I am grateful. Both he and Nan encouraged many to join in this delightful exercise and we honour them with love and gratitude."

In the next newsletter we will publish written obituaries for: Henry Conyers, written by Derek Wright, Ted Colley, written by his sons, John and Stephen Colley and Nan Colley, written by her sister, Margaret Parker. Also when the peal board is ready a get-together will be arranged at Caistor.

10. Bell Repair Fund

Claxby (10% £236.30) At the half-yearly meeting in July, this figure had been reported wrong. So just to clarify, for the bell repair fund, providing the fund is healthy, the grants will be issued for bells at 10% with a maximum of £400 per grant and a minimum of £100. Therefore the Claxby grant was correctly proposed as £236.30 by Roger Lord and seconded by Matthew Jeffery. All voted in favour. John Goodchild said after the work, the Claxby bells are very much improved, they are still Challenging, but less challenging then they used to be.

11. Ringing World Centenary Celebration

Elaine asked Sue Faull to explain this to us. For its Centenary celebrations, the Ringing World are having a celebration weekend in London, with Ringing access to towers including free access to West Minster Abbey. As part of the day, there will also be young ringers striking competition (under 19). The Lincoln guild has two teams to put forward, one from south Lincolnshire and the other from the northerly parts of the guild, which includes Daniel Young and George Thompson of Barton, So it was asked if the Branch could help our young ringers with the cost of this day. They each had to pay £10.00 entry fee and their train fare is £41.20. So in total to have George and Daniel represent the guild, it will cost £67.20. Simon Cole proposed that branch pay the whole lot as it is wonder to have young ringers able to represent the branch, Norman Palmer seconded this and every body voted in favour. We will ask the boys to give a report at the half yearly meeting of their day. Of the 12 teams that have entered the competition including Chester and Devon, it is great the Lincoln Guild are able to enter two teams and of the twelve only 3 teams will be ringing a method and Lincoln Guild will provide one of these teams. The competition will take place at Pimlico 700 weigh 8. Joy mentioned that along with Roger and Andrew, Geoff Bryant had played a key role on bring on these boy's with their ringing. Sue Faull also advertised the Guild wear which members are able to purchase, she intends to place and order in the next month or so. Elaine thanked Sue for her support to the our branch.

A list of events had been put out. Lorraine asked if Branch members would support a tour to Huddesfield, however, the date of Saturday 30^{th} July, seemed to be an issue, so this will be looked into at the next branch meeting.

Elaine thanked everyone for coming and for especially those who had helped to set up the room and arrange tea.
