Founders Prize for the Encouragement of Young Ringers

West Lindsey Branch Wins!

At the Central Council Meeting held in Newcastle on Bank Holiday Monday, it was announced that the West Lindsey Branch submission had been awarded the annual Founders' prize for the Encouragement of Young Ringers. There were 2 other entries but our submission was judged to be the best. This is very exciting news and a pleasing reward for the hard work that many members of the branch have put into raising the profile of ringing within their communities over the last few years.

Joy and Ian Till put the submission together which described the activities that had taken place over the last year or so- this was a long list but included: activities with schools - Messingham, Sturton, Bottesford and Gainsborough schools (Sixbel, wombel and belleplates featuring), activities at village shows eg. Epworth and Messingham, and involvement with scout / cub groups at Broughton, Willingham and Messingham. Also listed were details of social events that had been organised during the course of the year - the camping and activity day last summer, the Christmas Social and the ringing and skating mini outing in April.

The submission then detailed the measures of success. There are now more than 30 young ringers in Branch towers. Previous young ringers who are now in their late teens and early twenties continue to be a great support and are now beginning to teach the next generation. They are also organising their own activities independently. Quite a number of young ringers who were recruited through our various activities have brought along parents or siblings who are also now learning to ring.

Finally the submission had to talk about aspirations for the future. There is the obvious need to maintain the current momentum and level of enthusiasm and to try to extend this across all towers in the branch. This will mean ensuring that all towers have access to appropriate training opportunities. Continuing to develop the expertise of the older young ringers so that they can support and train new youngsters will be very important. It is hoped that the contribution made by our young ringers will be recognised and valued by the churches in which they ring.

At the time of writing we haven't heard how or when the prize (£500) will be presented. More anon!

West Lindsey Branch Ringers Outing.

Very early on a May Day Morning we started out day out to south of Nottingham. As it was a Bank Holiday there was little traffic and we made good time, arriving at the first church, Holy Rood, Edwalton. A pretty little church with a light ring of 6 bells. The Tenor being only 5cwt. These bells were rung from floor level and were a delight to ring.

From there we moved on to St. Peter at Ruddington, a much bigger church with a ring of 8 bells. These bells were rung from an upstairs ringing chamber which was not big enough to take the whole group as by now it numbered 33, several of them being juniors. These bells are very old, in fact according to the information in the church the second bell is dated 1540.

On then to the last church before lunch. St. Mary at East Leake, another church with a light ring of 6 bells, the Tenor being slightly heavier than at Edwalton at 7cwt. An interesting church, very light and airy, where the pews had been replaced with comfortable bright blue padded chairs. Very comfortable, ideal for sleeping if the sermon gets too boring! Again we were ringing from the ground floor, what a relief.

Our lunches had been booked at a very convenient Inn, the Three Horseshoes, just across the road from the church. Sue Faull and her three young ringers ate their packed lunch on the grass (or in a convenient tree) outside while those who had ordered a pub lunch of sandwiches went inside to be served with excellent sandwiches with chips and salad. This pub should be noted as having the friendliest lady's toilet we have ever come across. The old toilets, i.e. the ones across the yard, often had 'two seaters' side by side but this cubicle had two flush toilets facing each other across a narrow room. One can't help thinking Why?

After our lunch we headed further north to St. John, Stanford on Soar. This was the heaviest ring of the day, being an 8 15cwt ring. This, our second 8 bell ring was rung from an upstairs ringing room, even higher than the other one with more uneven steps. After everyone had rung at least twice we moved on to St. Winifred at Kingston on Soar with its 6 bells rung at ground level through the narrowest door I've ever seen. Even so, everyone managed to ring.

One more to go! On to Barton in Fabis and St George. Another 6 bells rung from round behind the organ. Here we were greeted with tea or coffee and biscuits and also some of us went on a toilet tour to the village hall just across the way. All very welcome after what had been a long day. Finally we set off for home.

Six very different churches, six very different rings of bells, 33 very tired, happy ringers, one beautiful, sunny day. Here's to the next time. Many thanks to everyone who organised it and made it possible.

Lincoln Diocesan Guild AGM – 26th April 2008

The last Saturday has a permanent significance for members of the Diocesan Guild of Bellringers. They come from all parts of the diocese to the AGM in Lincoln. The really early birds toil up the Cathedral stairs to ring before the 10am Eucharist then join others filling in Lincoln's unique Ringers' Chapel. This year the chapel was packed and around 70 people were present at the Service, which was conducted by the Guild President, Dean Philip Buckler with Jonathan Clarke, a ringer at Washingborough, as server.

Having given the day the proper beginning, we adjourned to Bailgate Methodist Church for the business of the AGM, held in the Chapel itself - a great improvement acoustically on recent venues. The Departed were remembered; the Apologies given (were there more absent than present?) and Philip Green and Judith Williamson were elected honorary members.

Philip has been a very active member of the Elloe Deaneries Branch for many years and has held most offices in the Branch. Perhaps his greatest contribution to the Guild is his printing of the Annual Report for a number of years and last year he produced, at no cost to the Guild, a Christmas card which raised over £800 for the Guild Belfry Repair Fund. Philip has also printed a number of publications for the Central Council.

Judith Williamson, until her recent move out of the County, was Guild Librarian, and was responsible for much reorganisation of the Library, and in particular for the revised and updated Library Catalogue. She has also been very involved in compiling a record of peal boards throughout the Diocese.

The rest of the statutory business of an AGM was swiftly dispatched with the Guild Master in the chair, greatly assisted by Dan Meyer dashing around with the portable mic. All the Guild Officers were re-elected with the exception of the Treasurer and Librarian. Roger Lord replaces Nicola Jones in the former office and Delia Heppenstall replaces Judith Williamson.

The Guild finances were reported to be in a healthy state, thanks to the efforts of the Guild Fund raising Committee. This also applies to the Guild Belfry Repair fund although there are a number of grants waiting to be paid out. The revitalised Fund Raising Committee has been very active in their first year with Guild Clothing for sale raising around £100, a raffle which has raised a surprising £400, and other initiatives in the pipeline.

Les Townsend, the Guild Secretary, spoke about a Tribute to Keith Buckingham, immediate Past Master who had died last year, which had been compiled and edited by John Ketteringham. A leather bound copy had been presented to Sue, Keith's widow, and a similar copy had been presented to the Guild Library.

AGM's do not just happen and we were grateful to Robin Heppenstall for giving our thanks to all who had contributed the labour to make it all work so smoothly.

The meeting was followed by an excellent Lunch in the adjacent Hall, prepared by Dot Mason and her helpers, and then it was the Guild eight bell Striking Competition which this year was held at Harmston. For those not taking part in the competition there was ringing at Waddington and Navenby. Tea was served by the Navenby ringers in the church, and we were treated to a ritual some had not observed before - the dragging of a large dustbin up the nave! However, all was revealed

when Dorothy Robinson delved into the depths and extracted the winning raffle tickets. It was then time to draw the Guild raffle and then the results of the Striking Competition were announced by Anita Blundell from Pickering. The Central Branch were the winners.

The day finished with Evensong at the Cathedral, followed by ringing until 1930.

Altogether a most excellent day and all concerned with the arrangements are to be heartily congratulated. The number of young ringers taking part was very noticeable and gives a very good indication of the continuing strength of the Guild.

The sun came out long enough for us all to gather in the garden for a glass of sparkling wine and a piece of birthday cake (baked by Robin H for our cake stall 3 weeks previously, and very good it was too.)
